## Look at LCGRM

As this day begins, I lean back in my office chair and think about all of the blessings we have received during the past year. We have seen lives changed, buildings changed and re-purposed due to last year's fire, and we are continuing to change and enhance our programs.

I would like to work in reverse order in talking about the three areas mentioned above. The first item is to clarify the identity of the Las Cruces Gospel Rescue Mission (LCGRM). There has been a common misconception concerning an affiliation between LCGRM and the Community of Hope which is located across the street from our location.

We are an independent nonprofit organization, 501c(3), which does not receive any tax dollars for our budget income. LCGRM is a faith based entity which was established in 1972. The Community of Hope came along after the turn of the century, occupying land which is owned by the City of Las Cruces.

The only connection between our two organizations is that we work with the homeless, and we will occasionally work jointly on a service project. The best example of this was during the migrant influx in which both of us helped. The two shelters have different rules and provide different services.

After that rather lengthy clarification, let me talk about the changes in our program. We are now presenting our program to the homeless in a different manner. In our explanation, we are telling them that the overall scope of the program is to equip them for a productive return to society in which they will have a home and job for themselves. This combines many life skill classes and training as well as Bible classes and training on financial skills (budget).

Gone are the days of the entitlement attitude, and the "flop house" mentality. Another good change is the fact that we don't want drugs or alcohol to interfere with the progress of many of the people who want to make their lives better. We do random drug and alcohol testing with severe consequences when they test positive.

The thrift store (still at 2100 Missouri) has undergone a transformation and a name change. It is now called the Mission Boutique which carries better clothing and accessories. The prices are good and the open, well-designed presentation is very appealing to the eye.

The building on Solano is about ready to open (it may be by the time this gets to your mail box). Please drop by 1420 S. Solano for a cup of coffee and experience the Mission Cleaning Supply. We are excited about this new business venture which will help us and our community.

In an effort to show how these many changes have made an impact on people's lives, I have asked some of them to write a short blurb about their experience on the back of this newsletter.
